The Weaver Craft AGM was held prior to the Supper and took place in the Red Room within the High Mill of Verdant Works.

Deacon John Fyffe welcomed all Members to the meeting and after the usual formalities proceeded to pick out the highlights from his Deacon's Report, which demonstrated the significant level of activity undertaken by the Weaver Craft over the past eighteen months, despite the challenges presented by COVID.

Deacon John mentioned the donation of £500 from the Weaver Craft towards the distribution of PPE equipment within local care homes an extremely worthwhile initiative led by Past Deacon Alastair Scott and Craftsman Bob Low.

In June 2020 and June 2021, the annual Weavers awards were made to the two outstanding final year students at DJCAD: 2020 Francesca Rae and Adam Komuves first and second respectively and 2021 Eden Parkes and Charlotte Neilson.

Deacon John also paid tribute to Adrian Stewart who retired in 2020 from his role as Joint Clerk and to whom we send our thanks and best wishes.

To maintain contact during the depths of the lockdown it was suggested by Past Deacon Alastair Scott that a series of online lectures be held – accordingly, during March, April and May three lectures were given by Craftsman Dr Richard Irvine, Maureen Shaw, an illustrator from Badenoch and Ruaridh Wishart, Abertay University Archivist.

The subjects covered were:

- Discovering the World of Mr David Jeffrey, Verdant Works 1858-1884
- Behind the Scenes at the Museum, Textile Treasures at the Highland Folk Museum, Badenoch
- Abertay and its Historical Relationship with Textile Training.

All three lectures were of an extremely high standard and very well received – the intention is to organise something similar in 2022.

Deacon John also spoke about the official press launch of the Dundee Tapestry on Monday 23rd August in Verdant Works. Deacon John paid tribute to the specific expertise and experience of Craftswoman Frances Stevenson and Andrew Crummy (Designer of the Great Tapestry of Scotland) who have been instrumental in helping John get the project to this stage.

During his time as Deacon, John's enthusiasm and drive has taken this project from an 'idea' he had as Boxmaster to where it is today. The Weaver Craft are extremely grateful that John will continue to take the lead on the project with the intention of launching the finished Tapestry in 2023.

Boxmaster Paul Leigh was then asked to give a brief introduction to the two new members – more detailed introductions to be conducted during the main part of the evening. It is encouraging to see that new members are still being recruited to the Craft.

The Deacon then put forward the proposal for the new Office Bearers commencing with his Boxmaster Paul Leigh being appointed as the new Deacon of the Weaver Craft and Richard Irvine taking up the position of Boxmaster, both appointments were seconded at the meeting.

It was also approved that Ashleigh Slater will continue in the role as Schools Liaison Officer with the intention of getting the Intergenerational Project fully back up and running later in the year – post Covid. The ceremonial handing over of the 'Chain of Office' took place and the meeting closed with everyone proceeding to the Weavers Room for the supper.

Graeme's talk explored the impact climate has had on the levels of emigration from Scotland and in particular the 'need' to go in search of the sun to destinations such as Australia, New Zealand, and America.

Sir Waler Scott referred to the 'Twa Lands' meaning Scotland and whichever country the people emigrated to and Professor Morton referred to the recent display in the Verdant Works of the Scottish Diaspora Tapestry which highlighted not only the extraordinary range of skills these immigrants from

Scotland brought to their new homes but how fiercely they clung to their Scottish heritage by means of Highland Games, Burns Suppers etc.

Deacon Paul Leigh replied to the Speaker then presented him with a hip flask.

Due to Deacon Convener Iain Murray self-isolating, Robert agreed to deputise and presented an update on the Nine Trades activities.

Robert advised that the Nine Trades in year ending April 2021 had handed out £98k to various organisations throughout the area which, considering the difficulties of the last eighteen months, is an outstanding achievement.

Robert was pleased to report that bookings for Merry Halls (a key source of income for the Nine) are recovering as student life begins to return to normality following the difficulties presented by Covid.

Robert also advised that the Nine have established a new committee tasked with identifying new ways of raising funds - the emphasis being to raise funds for disbursement to the needy within the local area and on projects focused on schooling/education.

Robert completed his remarks by praising Late Deacon John Fyffe, in particular for his work on the Dundee Tapestry, and sending his best wishes to new Deacon Paul Leigh and the Deacon's Committee as they continue the good work of maintaining and developing the profile of the Weaver Craft.
